ACCP Academy Programming in Orlando This April

The 2009 ACCP/ESCP International Congress on Clinical Pharmacy this spring includes programming developed in part with the three current Academy Certificate Programs: Leadership and Management, Teaching and Learning, and Research and Scholarship. April 24–28, meet with colleagues from around the globe in Orlando, Florida, for a week of education and networking. Academy programming begins on Friday, April 24, with three “premeeting” symposia. You need not be enrolled in the Academy to attend any of the Academy programs. For more information on the Academy Certificate Programs, visit the Web site at <http://www.accp.com/academy/>.

The required foundational course for the Research and Scholarship Certificate Program, the *Research Primer*, is a full-day program designed to provide participants with an introduction to fundamental research concepts. This program will stimulate idea development for a longitudinal research project. Faculty will discuss working within research teams, scientific writing, developing a research question, and other practical aspects of the research process.

Another full day program, the *Leadership Primer*, is the prerequisite course for the Leadership and Management Certificate Program. Attendees will engage in discussions on the concepts and theories of organizational behavior while learning to apply situational leadership concepts to their own pharmacy practice situations. Faculty will examine the motivations and stages of change in various professional or interprofessional settings, as well as the use of principle-centered power in the professional environment.



A half-day program, *Assessing Student Learning*, will be held Friday afternoon and is one of the required components of the Teaching and Learning Certificate Program. The course is designed for clinicians who teach students, residents, and health care professionals in the classroom, in the clinic, or at the bedside. Participants will learn how to design and assess learning experiences using ability-based educational principles and strategies. Faculty will also present methods for enhancing student learning in both the didactic and clinical setting.

Other Academy programs during the Congress include both required and elective offerings in each Certificate Program’s curriculum. The Leadership and Management programs scheduled are *The Attributes of a Leader* and *Getting the Right Results: Steps for Leading an Effective Team*. *The Attributes of a Leader* is third in the series of required courses for those enrolled in the ACCP Academy Leadership program. This offering will explore contemporary literature as it examines the attributes of great leaders. *Getting the Right Results* is a new elective Academy course and will be taught by Todd Sorensen, Pharm.D., from the University of Minnesota. Participants in this course will learn about useful tools that can facilitate the development of an effective group, as well as the elements needed for leading a group toward achieving its desired goals.

The two Research and Scholarship Development courses scheduled during the Congress are *Statistical Issues* and a new elective titled *Survey Methods: Applications in Educational and Health Services Research*. *Statistical Issues* is second in the series of required courses for those enrolled in the Academy’s Research and Scholarship track. This course is designed for participants to develop competencies in research question development and analysis. The elective course will be led by Diane Beck, Pharm.D., from the University of Florida and Kathleen Bungay, Pharm.D., M.S., FCCP, from Tufts Medical Center. Participants in this session will gain practical experience in critiquing potential survey questions and assessing the quality of a survey project.

Two Teaching and Learning programs are also scheduled: *Planning for Effective Teaching* and *Improving Medication Safety Through Interprofessional Education (IPE)*. *Planning for Effective Teaching* is first in the series of required courses in the Teaching and Learning track. This course will provide participants with a framework for promoting higher and more sustained levels of learning in the classroom. The course on IPE was developed by the Education and Training PRN; it will include both European and U.S. perspectives on this timely topic.

Of course, in addition to Academy programming, meeting attendees will have access to the entire menu of International Congress sessions, Pharmacotherapy Preparatory Course curricula, and PPAG programming. He has practiced and taught in hospital, clinic, and community settings.

Dr. Webb has more than 20 years of national pharmacy association executive experience in the areas of policy analysis, advocacy, and professional affairs, having also served on the staffs of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy (1992-2000) and the American Pharmacists Association (1987-1992). Before moving to Washington, he served for 10 years as Director of Pharmacy Education of the Mountain Area Health Education Center in Asheville, North Carolina, holding faculty appointments in Pharmacy and Family Medicine at the University of North Carolina Schools of Pharmacy and Medicine. His clinical practice and

teaching activities were in the area of critical care adult and pediatric pharmacotherapy.

"Being a member of the ACCP staff for the past 8 years has been the highlight of my professional career," said Dr. Webb. "I look forward to working with our leadership in identifying new opportunities to represent and serve our members and the discipline of clinical pharmacy in a time of dynamic political and economic change. Call for FCCP, Parker Award, and Spring Award Nominations: Submit by February 15

Nominations for the 2009 Parker Medal, 2009 ACCP Fellows (FCCP), and 2010 Spring Awards (New Investigator, New Educator, and New Clinical Practitioner) are due soon. All nomination materials, including letters, vitae or resumés, and other supporting documents, should be submitted online to ACCP. The online nominations portal specifies the nominating materials required for each award. This portal is available at <http://www.accp.com/membership/nominations.aspx>.

The nomination deadline for each of the awards below is **February 15, 2009**; additional information regarding award criteria may be obtained from ACCP headquarters.

2009 ACCP Fellows: Fellowship is awarded in recognition of continued excellence in clinical pharmacy practice or research. Nominees must have been full members of ACCP for at least 5 years, must have been in practice for at least 10 years since receipt of their highest professional pharmacy degree, and must have made a sustained contribution to ACCP through activities such as presentation at College meetings; service to ACCP committees, PRNs, chapters, or publications; or election as an officer. Candidates may be nominated by any two Full Members, other than the nominee, or by any Fellow. Current members of the Board of Regents and the Credentials: FCCP Committee are ineligible for consideration.

2009 Paul F. Parker Medal for Distinguished Service to the Profession of Pharmacy:

Recognizes an individual who has made outstanding and sustained contributions to improving or expanding the profession of pharmacy in an area of professional service—including, but not limited to, patient care, leadership, administration, financial, technological, information processing, service delivery, models of care, and advocacy.

The award is not limited to pharmacists or ACCP members. All nominations must include the nominee's curriculum vitae, resumé, or biographical sketch, as available, and at least three letters of support that describe the individual's accomplishments relative to the award criteria. At least one letter of support must be from an individual outside the nominee's current practice locale. Current members of the Board of Regents, Selection Committee, or ACCP staff are ineligible.



2010 New Clinical Practitioner Award: This award will be given at the 2010 ACCP Spring Forum/Pharmacotherapy Preparatory Course, April 23–27, 2010, in Charlotte, NC. Its purpose is to recognize and honor a new clinical practitioner who has made outstanding contributions to the health of patients and/or the practice of clinical pharmacy. Nominees must have been Full Members of ACCP at the time of nomination and members at any level for a minimum of 3 years, and it must have been less than 6 years since completion of their terminal training or degree, whichever is most recent. Fellows of ACCP (i.e., “FCCP”) are not eligible. All nominations must include a letter of nomination detailing the nominee’s qualifications for the award, the nominee’s curriculum vitae, and two letters of support that describe the individual’s accomplishments relative to the award criteria. At least one of the letters of support must be from an individual outside the nominee’s current place of employment. Additional letters of support also may be included. Current members of the Board of Regents, Awards Committee, or ACCP staff are ineligible.

2009 New Educator Award: This award will be given at the 2010 ACCP Spring Forum/Pharmacotherapy Preparatory Course, April 23–27, 2010, in Charlotte, NC. Its purpose is to recognize and honor a new educator for outstanding contributions to the discipline of teaching and to the education of health care practitioners. Nominees must have been Full Members of ACCP at the time of nomination and members at any level for a minimum of 3 years, and it must have been less than 6 years since completion of their terminal training or degree, whichever is most recent. Fellows of ACCP (i.e., “FCCP”) are not eligible. All nominations must include a letter of nomination detailing the nominee’s qualifications for the award, the nominee’s curriculum vitae, and two letters of support that describe the individual’s accomplishments relative to the award criteria. At least one of the letters of support must be from an individual outside the nominee’s current place of employment. Additional letters of support may be included. Current members of the Board of Regents, Awards Committee, or ACCP staff are ineligible.

2009 New Investigator Award: This award will be given at the 2010 ACCP Spring Forum/Pharmacotherapy Preparatory Course, April 23–27, 2010, in Charlotte, NC. Its purpose is to highlight the research program of an ACCP member who has made a major impact on an aspect of clinical pharmaceutical science. Nominees must have been members of ACCP for more than 3 years; must have completed their terminal training or degree, whichever is most recent, less than 6 years earlier; and must have a research program with a significant publication record having a programmatic theme or an especially noteworthy single publication. Fellows of ACCP (i.e., “FCCP”) are not eligible. All nominations must include a letter of nomination detailing the nominee’s qualifications for the award, the nominee’s curriculum vitae, and two letters of support that describe the individual’s accomplishments relative to the award criteria. At least one of the letters of support must be from an individual outside the nominee’s current place of employment. Additional letters of support may be included. Current members of the Board of Regents, Awards Committee, or ACCP staff are ineligible.



President’s Column

Ambulatory Care as a Specialty

Together with the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP) and the American Pharmacists Association (APhA), ACCP jointly sponsored and participated in developing a petition to the Board of Pharmaceutical Specialties (BPS) to recognize Ambulatory Care as a specialty. ACCP also participated in the initial evaluation of the potential for specialty status by providing names of ambulatory care members to BPS when it conducted its role delineation. The documentation for the petition was submitted in November. At least three open hearings will be held in which individuals and groups will have an opportunity to provide comments. In addition, any individual or group may provide written comments to BPS (visit http://www.accp.com/govt/positionPapers.aspx#Petitions_title to view the petition or its executive summary). The first open hearing was held in December at the ASHP Midyear Clinical Meeting in Orlando; two more are scheduled in April at the upcoming APhA meeting in San Antonio and ACCP’s International Congress in Orlando. BPS will then study the petition and the comments received as the determination is made whether to recognize ambulatory care as a specialty.

I had the opportunity to attend the first open hearing at ASHP as the BPS liaison to ACCP. This was my last official BPS duty, as my term on that board ended in 2008. I would characterize much of the hearing’s commentary as positive, together with some requests for additional information about the specialty petitioning process. The Society for Infectious Disease Pharmacists (SIDP) and ACCP’s Infectious Diseases PRN did go on record at the meeting as opposing the recognition of Ambulatory Care as a specialty, although it appeared to be largely based on their interests in having BPS restructure its recognition processes to allow smaller groups of pharmacists practicing in specialty areas to have access to a certification examination. Currently, infectious diseases, like cardiology, is an “Added Qualification” within the Pharmacotherapy specialty.

ACCP has urged BPS to evaluate needed changes in the current processes for developing specialties, and the 2008 Certification Affairs Committee recently completed an ACCP White Paper that proposes potential options for revision of the existing specialty certification framework (visit <http://www.accp.com/docs/positions/whitePapers/CertifAffrsWPFinal11-08.pdf> to review this paper). We continue to believe that the BPS model developed many years ago, although useful until now, has not necessarily fostered the growth and diversification of specialties. Furthermore, we believe that the specialty recognition process should be more coherently aligned with the profession’s PGY2 residency specialties.

ACCP is committed to the continued expansion of specialty recognition and believes in the importance of supporting the pursuit of Ambulatory Care as a specialty. Thus, the Board of Regents decided that the College should serve as a co-petitioner for this new specialty together with ASHP and APhA. ACCP has stated that “future clinical pharmacy practitioners should be board-certified specialists” (see <http://www.accp.com/docs/positions/whitePapers/>

[wp_phco200612.pdf](#)); however, this vision cannot be realized until specialty certification is made available to pharmacists engaged in specialty or subspecialty practices that extend beyond the current five BPS specialties: Nuclear Pharmacy (est. 1978), Nutrition Support Pharmacy (est. 1988), Pharmacotherapy (est. 1988), Psychiatric Pharmacy (est. 1992), and Oncology Pharmacy (est. 1996).

Will Ambulatory Care be recognized as a specialty? If so, what implications will that have for the future? Pharmacotherapy is by far the largest specialty within our profession. The continued annual increases in registrants for the Pharmacotherapy certification examination suggest that this growth will continue. Many ACCP members call this specialty their own. The other BPS specialties have increased in size more gradually but are sustained by both ACCP members and nonmembers who continue to demonstrate their knowledge through the certification and recertification process. If the Ambulatory Care specialty is recognized by BPS, it could create considerable opportunity for clinical pharmacists providing direct patient care in community pharmacies, clinics, and other ambulatory care settings to demonstrate their competence in this specialty. Perhaps this, in turn, will help in our continuing battle for expanded recognition of clinical pharmacists' direct patient care services by patients, other health care professionals, and payers. Because most pharmacists practice in community pharmacy settings, the availability of this specialty might motivate more pharmacists to develop direct patient care services in these settings and to demonstrate their competence through certification. Ultimately, it is about helping our patients realize better outcomes from their medication therapy. And remember that expanding specialist certification also has the potential to increase recognition of the value of pharmacists and the care they provide to patients. I enthusiastically support initiatives that can achieve these goals!

Kuo Appointed ACCP PBRN Director



The Research Institute is pleased to announce the appointment of Grace Kuo, Pharm.D., MPH, as Director of the ACCP Practice-Based Research Network (PBRN). Dr. Kuo is Associate Professor of Clinical Pharmacy in the Skaggs School of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences; she is also a member of the University of California–San Diego (UCSD) Health Services Research Center. At UCSD, Dr. Kuo is conducting several practice-based research projects with the Medical Group, Internal Medicine, and Family Medicine clinics. She collaborates with the Health Services Research Center and the Center for Management Science in Health on campus. Since 2007, Dr. Kuo has been collaborating with pharmacist practitioners and researchers to form a pharmacist-based practice-based research network in San Diego. Network practitioners work in inpatient and outpatient pharmacies from community and institutional settings.

Before joining UCSD, Grace was Program Director for a physician-based practice-based research network, the Southern Primary-care Urban Research Network, from

2001 to 2007. Dr. Kuo served as principal investigator, co-investigator, and consultant on Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ)-, National Institutes of Health (NIH)-, and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)-funded projects.

Dr. Kuo has been a member of ACCP since 1997 and is an active member of the Ambulatory Care PRN. She has been a speaker on PBRN and clinical research topics at several ACCP national and spring forum meetings. Regarding the new ACCP PBRN, Dr Kuo stated:

I applaud the efforts of the Boards of ACCP in envisioning and supporting the national PBRN. Other health care professionals—including physicians, dentists, and nurses—have been engaged in organized PBRN research on the national level for many years. I truly believe the contribution of clinical pharmacist and pharmacist researchers through the national PBRN will help redesign our health care system and improve the quality and safety of patient care.

Dr. Kuo received her undergraduate degree in psychobiology at UCLA. She completed her pharmacy degrees at the Massachusetts College of Pharmacy and Oregon State University/Oregon Health Sciences University. Dr. Kuo completed postdoctoral training at the W.G. Magnuson Clinical Center at the NIH in Bethesda, Maryland. She holds a master's of public health degree in health promotion and health education from the University of Texas–Houston School of Public Health; currently, she is completing her Ph.D. training in health services research.

Dr. Kuo's research includes medication safety, practice-based health services research, and chronic disease management. Currently, she and her investigative teams are conducting the following studies: "The Effect of Electronic Medical Records on Medication Safety" (funded by AHRQ R03 HS14406); "Effects of Literacy on Medication Safety in the Elderly" (funded by NIA/NIH R03 AG026420); "Safe Use of Medications in Primary Care Practices" (funded by AHRQ K08 HS014552); and "Pharmacogenomics Education Program: Bridging the Gap Between Science and Practice" (funded by CDC U38GD00007).

Dr. Kuo began her part-time appointment with the Research Institute on January 1, 2009. The ACCP PBRN is expected to launch the online registry for both existing PBRNs and individual clinical pharmacists in early 2009.

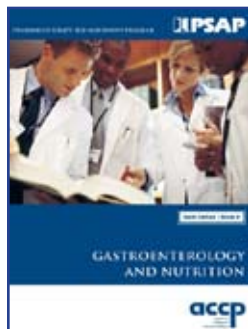
"This group of outstanding faculty brings extensive and diverse research and grantsmanship experience to the program in order to meet the needs of the participants," stated Jacque Marinac, Director of the Research Institute. "Most are returning faculty who voiced they were energized to be part of something extraordinary like the FIT Program." Although it has only been 6 months since the end of the 2008 FIT Program, to date, 10 new applications for funding have been submitted from the 2008 team. "This has exceeded our expectations," said Dr. Marinac, "but [it] really speaks to the level of commitment both the mentors and mentees have made to reach their funding goals."

The **FIT Program** is an annual, intensive, 1-week, hands-on program for up to 25 experienced pharmacist investigators who have not yet been awarded significant peer-reviewed extramural funding as a principal investigator. The **2009 FIT Program** will be held **July 11–July 16, 2009**, at the **University of Utah, College of Pharmacy**. Through this mentored program, you will take necessary steps toward preparing a K, R01, or similar investigator-initiated application for submission to the NIH or other major funding source. Gastroenterology and Nutrition Is the Latest in the PSAP-VI Series

Gastroenterology and Nutrition is the latest book from the Pharmacotherapy Self-Assessment Program, sixth edition (PSAP-VI). This ninth book in the series provides an up-to-date review of therapeutic advancements and challenges in several important areas of gastroenterology and nutrition. The book is divided into three learning modules. The first module covers the gastroenterology topics of hepatitis B and C virus infection, drug-induced liver disease, and peptic ulcer disease. Module two includes chapters that update the reader on the drug and nutrition therapy of patients who have undergone bariatric surgery, the use of probiotics for various conditions, and the treatment of colon cancer. The third module focuses on nutrition issues in clinical practice, including chapters on nutrition in patients receiving renal replacement therapies, home parenteral nutrition, immunonutrition, and the use of dietary supplements. Each chapter has an extensive annotated bibliography that identifies key research articles, books, and other resources relevant to the major content areas. *Gastroenterology and Nutrition* is designed to assist pharmacists who want to update their knowledge regarding several key gastroenterology and nutrition conditions.



Gastroenterology and Nutrition was released on January 15 and is the latest release in the 11-book PSAP-VI series. The book is available in both print and online formats. Continuing pharmacy education credit is available for those who successfully complete the self-assessment examinations provided with each module. The three modules offer a combined total of 21.5 hours of continuing pharmacy education credit. The sixth edition of PSAP features several improvements over previous editions, including all-online testing; answer books supplied as PDF files; shorter, more concise chapters; and expanded annotated bibliographies.

R. Donald Harvey Awarded PPD Bioanalytical Fluid and Tissue Grant Award

Dr. R. Donald Harvey was awarded the first PPD Bioanalytical Fluid and Tissue Grant Award for his proposal titled, "Defining the Interaction of Docetaxel and Lonafarnib in Advanced Malignancies." Dr. Harvey will travel to a state-of-the-art PPD facility in Richmond, Virginia, in late January to work and learn from on-site scientists within PPD.



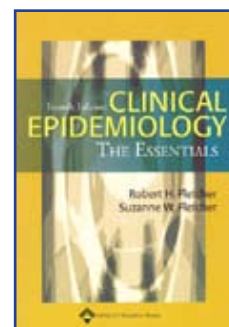
When asked how this grant will help his professional development, Dr. Harvey stated that he hopes this grant will permit continued research with docetaxel-based combinations of agents that are CYP3A4 inhibitors/substrates so that pharmacokinetics (PK) data can be gathered to correlate with tissue-based assays. "At Emory University, we are currently conducting a docetaxel/RAD001 phase I trial that includes PK analysis of both agents as well as modulation of key mTOR pathway components (p-p70S6K, p-AKT, p-4E-BP1, and p-S6) in tumor tissue," Dr. Harvey said. "This grant will help to publish our current results and help me to establish a path to further PK analysis in anticancer drug development."

Through this investigator development award, PPD grant award winners will be reimbursed for their transportation and housing costs while working at the PPD facility. 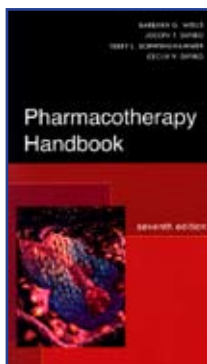
