One of three new options for obtaining BCACP recertification credit, the "Ambulatory Care Pharmacy Preparatory Review and Recertification Course" provides a comprehensive overview of Ambulatory Care Pharmacy, current practice and management options, and guidelines of common patient care problems dealt with by the Ambulatory Care Pharmacist on a regular basis. Similarly, the "Pharmacotherapy Preparatory Review and Recertification Course" is one of three ways to obtain BCPS recertification credit. This course provides a comprehensive overview of pharmacotherapeutics, current management options, and guidelines of common patient care problems within the scope of services provided by pharmacotherapy specialists.

Both courses will be presented at ACCP Updates

in Therapeutics® 2012 in Reno, Nevada, from April 27 to May 1, 2012. Registration is available at www.accp. com/ut. Updated annually, both review and recertification courses offer a minimum of 21 contact hours of continuing pharmacy education credit toward either BCPS recertification (Pharmacotherapy Course) or BCACP recertification (Ambulatory Care Course). Both BCPS and BCACP recertificants may complete the relevant course for recertification credit up to two times during their 7-year recertification cycle. Neither the Ambulatory Care course nor the Pharmacy course may be completed for recertification credit in 2 consecutive years. To earn recertification credit for the preparatory and recertification courses, recertificants must attend the live program or complete the instructional materials for home study (available in June 2012) and successfully complete the Web-based posttest for the relevant course by September 1, 2012. Recertificants must complete the entire relevant course to be eligible to earn recertification credit. Partial credit is not available.

Recruitment Under Way for New Editor-in-Chief for *Pharmacotherapy*

After 27 years of distinguished service as Editor-in-Chief, Dr. Richard T. Scheife has announced that he will re-

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tire from his position at the end of 2012. The *Pharma-cotherapy* Board of Directors has developed a 3-year strategic plan that includes moving the publication of the

journal to a commercial publisher and recruiting a university-based, nationally recognized, clinical pharmacy research scholar as the next Editor-in-Chief of *Pharmacotherapy*. In January 2012, publication of the journal was successfully transitioned to Wiley-Blackwell publications. With Dr. Scheife's retirement at the end of 2012, the Board of Directors is now initiating a search process to recruit a new Editor-in-Chief who will assume this role in January 2013. Dr. Scheife has agreed to remain at the journal until the next Editor-in-Chief is appointed and in place.

A consummate editor, reviewer, mentor, and scholar, Dr. Scheife will be honored during the 2012 ACCP Annual Meeting in Hollywood, Florida, October 21–24, 2012. More details about Dr. Scheife's recognition at October's Annual Meeting will follow this summer. Updates Announced for the Next PSAP Series

Murphy, Pharm.D., FCCP, FASHP, Professor of Pharmacy Practice and Science and Associate Dean for Academic and Professional Affairs, the University of Arizona College of Pharmacy, Tucson, Arizona; and Mary Wun-Len Lee, Pharm.D., FCCP, BCPS, Vice President and Chief Academic Officer, Pharmacy and Health Sciences Education, Midwestern University, and Professor of Pharmacy Practice, Midwestern University, Chicago College of Pharmacy, Downers Grove, Illinois. The credit opportunities provided by the PSAP-VIII series, together with other ACCP specialty recertification products for pharmacotherapy, will offer substantially more than the 120 hours of credit required by the Board of Pharmacy Specialties for recertification as a Board Certified Pharmacotherapy Specialist. 



Dr. Shareen El-Ibiary is an associate professor of pharmacy practice at Midwestern University College of Pharmacy in Glendale, Arizona. She received her Pharm.D. degree from the University of South Carolina in Columbia, South Carolina, in 2000 and completed a general pharmacy practice residency at the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF) in 2001, where she

subsequently completed a certificate program for additional training in clinical research. She has been board certified in pharmacotherapy since 2003. Dr. El-Ibiary started her academic career at UCSF in the area of drug information, where her interest in women's health developed from receiving several consumer questions pertaining to that area. She made the change to focus on women's health and worked in a specialty clinic in the latter part of her time at USCF. During her time in California, she was very active in local, state, and national organizations. She was president of the Golden Gate Society of Health-System Pharmacists and, in 2007, became a fellow of the California Society of Health-System Pharmacists. She has been the public policy liaison and chair of the ACCP Women's Health Practice and Research Network (PRN) and is currently an ACCP College of Pharmacy Faculty Liaison. She has been awarded project preceptor of the year and the Dean's Apple Award for Teaching Excellence at UCSF.

Three years ago, she made the move to Midwestern University in Glendale, Arizona, where she maintains an internal medicine practice at Banner Thunderbird Medical Center. Although her practice is internal medicine, she maintains a strong interest in women's health and continues to collaborate with others in the field. Her areas of interest and research include women's health, specifically hormones and contraception, pharmacogenetics, and innovative teaching. Dr. El-Ibiary currently teaches a variety of courses at the College and coordinates a women's health elective, as well as a first-year pharmacy course, "Integrated Sequences 2 and Professional Skills Development." She is involved in many different publications, including writing a PSAP chapter in women's health and serving as the women's health section editor and chapter author for Koda-Kimble's Applied Therapeutics. She also serves on the editorial board for the Journal of the American Pharmacists Association and is a current faculty member of ACCP's Updates in Therapeutics®: The Pharmacotherapy Preparatory Review and Recertification Course.

Dr. El-Ibiary's early exposure to the health care setting came from her mother, a physician. Dr. El-Ibiary showed an early interest in the sciences, and her love of teaching led her to seek a career path that would encompass each of these areas. She first became interested in clinical pharmacy while working as a pharmacy technician and pursuing her undergraduate degree. In particular, she liked the idea of making interventions and counseling patients. What cemented her future career choice, though, came later in pharmacy school,

when she identified with one of her professors who was a clinical specialist and whose faculty job description sounded like the ideal career path. She saw that, as a faculty member, she could combine the clinical/science aspect of pharmacy with her love of teaching in an academic setting. She sought out information on how her professor obtained her position, which set her on a path that has allowed her to touch the lives of numerous students, patients, and colleagues.

ACCP has been an integral part of Dr. El-Ibiary's career. Many of her opportunities have come to her through her involvement with the College. When she first started as a faculty member, she saw a meeting announcement for the ACCP Annual Meeting and noted that a pre-seminar workshop for junior faculty was scheduled. Although she was unfamiliar with the organization at the time, she attended the session, which she believes was one of her best decisions. She met other junior faculty starting out, made several friends/connections, and learned about finding a mentor and ways to deal with struggles in academia. It was an excellent seminar. She enjoyed every aspect of the meeting and met experts in various fields. As she focused her interests on women's health, she found the Women's Health where she connected with other colleagues interested in and dedicated to women's health. The connections she made through the PRN were priceless. From this group, ideas, opportunities, and growth in women's health practice emerged. She was able to take more of a leadership role within the group, which provided her many opportunities with respect to collaborations, publications, and speaking engagements. Her knowledge in the area grew as well from learning about others' practices and research endeavors. She is still in contact with many of the colleagues she met at her first meeting and continues to collaborate with them. She noted that many of her accomplishments would not have been possible were it not for her ACCP membership.

Dr. El-Ibiary has given back to ACCP by fostering student involvement. She is currently an ACCP College of Pharmacy Faculty Liaison for Midwestern, and she has served as a reviewer for the Clinical Pharmacy Challenge, *Pharmacotherapy*, and PSAP. She was the public policy liaison for 3 years and the chair/chair-elect for the Women's Health PRN. She is currently a faculty member for ACCP's *Updates in Therapeutics®: The Pharmacotherapy Preparatory Review and Recertification Course*, and she has presented regularly at ACCP Annual Meetings. She encourages others to join ACCP and hopes to continue to serve the College and help keep it growing so that others may benefit from it as she has.

Oncology Drug Shortage Study Now Recruiting Heme/Onc Pharmacists



In February 2012, the ACCP PBRN launched the *Oncology Drug Shortage Study* for PBRN members who specialize in hematology/oncology. The objective of this study is to determine the impact of cytarabine shortage on the timing, dose, or selection of chemotherapy drug regimen for adult patients with acute myeloid leukemia (AML), particularly minority patients with AML, relative to a non-shortage period. Cytarabine is the focus of this research study because shortage of this agent may affect life expectancy, and documented shortage has been widespread.

We invite eligible ACCP PBRN members who practice within the inpatient Hematology/Oncology specialty area to consider participating in this retrospective data collection research study. The study protocol, central IRB approval letter, data collection tools, and training materials are loaded under step 4 within PBRN-Connect: http://www.accpri.org/signin/index.aspx. This study will use the REDCap Web-based electronic data capture tool. For more information, contact us at pbrn@accp.com.

From the Desk of the ACCP PBRN Network Director

Practice-based research networks (PBRNs) link relevant clinical questions with rigorous research methods in real-life settings and produce scientific information that is not only externally valid, but also easily assimilated into practice. Since its inception only 3 years ago, the ACCP PBRN's infrastructure has been developed and the first study (evaluating and characterizing medication errors identified by pharmacists) completed, thereby showing the feasibility of the network and introducing practice-based

research to many who participated in and observed this study. In the next few years, we will be leading and collaborating with others in several studies that truly demonstrate the value of the ACCP PBRN in developing research relevant to practicing ACCP clinicians.

As a clinical practitioner, you will find different ways of getting involved with the ACCP PBRN. We facilitate developing grant submissions and undertake funded research projects with independent investigators. Any ACCP PBRN member may contribute to these studies as a study participant, collecting data on questions relevant to clinical practice. For example, we are currently recruiting participants who practice in the Hematology/Oncology specialty area for the Oncology Drug Shortage Study to determine the impact of the cytarabine shortage on the timing, dose, or selection of chemotherapy drug regimen for adult patients with acute myeloid leukemia (AML), particularly minority patients with AML, relative to a non-shortage period.

This year, we will also be initiating a study with the objective of developing and testing a comprehensive framework for assessing the delivery of clinical pharmacist care in a variety of settings. We anticipate that the identification of clinical pharmacist activities associated with improved outcomes will revolutionize the manner in which clinical pharmacists are taught and practice.

In addition, you may lead or propose your own research study. The PBRN is interested in supporting and working with anyone who has a great idea. If your position makes it difficult for you to lead the research, consider collaborating with an experienced researcher. The researcher can be someone from your own institution, or we can assist in finding someone with similar interests at another institution. When you recommend ideas that are translated into research, your involvement with the research project can be whatever fits your needs, from advisory panel member to coinvestigator to lead investigator. All investigators wishing to collaborate with the ACCP PBRN will be asked to complete a short ACCP PBRN Project Concept Paper found at www.accpri.org. We want every interested ACCP member to have an opportunity to interact and work with the PBRN.

Competition Overview

The ACCP Clinical Pharmacy Challenge is a teambased competition. Teams of three students will compete against teams from other schools and colleges of pharmacy in a "quiz bowl"—type format. Only one team per institution may enter the competition. Institutions with branch campuses, distance satellites, and/or several interested teams are encouraged to conduct a local competition. ACCP provides a written examination that institutions may use as a basis for their local competition, if they so desire. This examination will be available on or after April 2, 2012, and may be requested by the ACCP Faculty Liaison or registering faculty member by e-mail. Preliminary rounds of the national competition will be conducted virtually in September. The quarterfinal, semifinal, and final rounds will be held live at the ACCP Annual Meeting in Hollywood, Florida, October 20–22, 2012.

Each round will consist of questions offered in the three distinct segments indicated below. Item

content used in each segment has been developed and reviewed by an expert panel of clinical pharmacy practitioners and educators.

- Trivia/Lightning
- Clinical Case
- Jeopardy-style

Each team advancing to the quarterfinal round held at the ACCP Annual Meeting will receive three complimentary student full meeting registrations. Each team member will receive an ACCP gift certificate for \$125 and a certificate of recognition. In addition to the above, semifinal teams not advancing to the final round will receive a semifinal team plaque for display at their institution. The second-place team will receive a \$750 cash award (\$250 to each member) and a commemorative team plaque. The winning team will receive a \$1500 cash award (\$500 to each member), and each team member will receive a commemorative plaque. A team trophy will be awarded to the winning institution.

Students are not required to be members of ACCP to participate. Team registration may be submitted online and must be initiated by a current faculty member at the respective institution. Students interested in forming a team should contact their ACCP faculty liaison. If no ACCP Faculty Liaison has been identified, any faculty member from the institution may initiate the registration process. The registering faculty member must confirm the eligibility of all team members and/or alternates online before a team will be permitted to compete in the Clinical Pharmacy Challenge. The deadline to complete team registration and confirm eligibility is September 4, 2012.

The fellow program, now in its sixth year, provides pharmacists with unique insights into health care policy analysis and development, under the auspices of the Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU) School of Pharmacy in collaboration with the American College of Clinical Pharmacy

(ACCP) and the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP). The current fellow, Sarah Steinhardt, serves as a health policy fellow for Senator Ron Wyden (D-Ore.).

Dr. Griffing earned his Pharm.D. degree from Midwestern University School of Pharmacy in 2010 and his master's degree in public health with a concentration in health systems and policy from Johns Hopkins University, Bloomberg School of Public Health, in 2011. He currently practices as an oncology pharmacist at The Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore.

Dr. Griffing will begin his fellowship on September 1. After a structured orientation to Congress from VCU faculty and the Brookings Institute, he will spend 1 month with the ASHP government affairs and policy team and 1 month with the ACCP government and professional affairs staff. In November, he will begin working as a policy fellow on a congressional committee or with the personal staff of a U.S. senator or representative.

From the Desk of the ACCP PBRN Community Advisory Panel Chair

ACCP members are starting to learn more about getting involved with ACCP Practice-Based Research Network (PBRN) research studies. For example, in the past 2 years, members of the PBRN were encouraged to participate in the *MEDAP Study* and are now being recruited to the *Oncology Drug Shortage Study*. However, members may not know much about the PBRN's Community Advisory Panel (CAP).

The CAP is a standing committee to the ACCP PBRN with the mission to represent the breadth and depth of PBRN members. The CAP has members practicing in ambulatory care, cardiology, family medicine, health outcomes, pediatrics, and pharmacy administration from across the United States. The PBRN calls on the CAP to review proposals, do beta-testing for data collection methods, and provide input on IRB applications.

To increase participation and activity within the PBRN, CAP members are available to speak to your group – at your hospital or college of pharmacy, local meeting, statewide meeting, or regional meeting of any pharmacy organization. Members of CAP can provide an overview of the PBRN, the IRB submission process, the types of assistance provided, and the benefits of participating in the PBRN. Members can also provide printed materials to the group both for future reference and for taking back to respective groups. In addition, if you are interested in working with the PBRN in this way, consider submitting your name to the CAP next year. Panel members participate for a 3-year term, and the chair/vice chair changes every year.
