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Marinac Joins ACCP as Director of Research

Jacqueline Marinac, Pharm.D., BCPS, has been named ACCP Director of Research following an extensive national search. Dr. Marinac will join the ACCP staff on August 20. She will serve as the chief operations officer for the ACCP Research Institute, promoting communication between the Research Institute Board of Trustees and the ACCP Board of Regents, and directing and supervising the Research Institute staff. In addition, she will oversee the creation of new College initiatives that facilitate investigator development, including investigator education and training programs within the Research Institute and the ACCP Academy.

Dr. Marinac received her bachelor of pharmacy degree, doctor of pharmacy degree, and residency training certificate from the University of Utah. She completed a Pharmacokinetic Fellowship at the Laboratory of Applied Pharmacokinetics in Los Angeles, California, and a Cardiovascular Pharmacokinetic Fellowship at the University of Colorado in Denver. Dr. Marinac has served on the faculty of the University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Medicine and on the faculty of the Kansas City University of Medicine and Biosciences. She also worked for Pfizer, Inc. as a clinical education consultant where she was primarily engaged in clinical outcomes research and quality of care protocol design and analyses. Most recently, Dr. Marinac was the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and Education, and Professor of Pharmacology at the Kansas City University of Medicine and Biosciences.

"I'm excited about the forthcoming launch of ACCP's investigator development programs and the opportunity to establish de novo solutions that will address what I believe is a seriously unmet need within the clinical pharmacy community," Marinac commented. "As a past ACCP research grant recipient, I have a true appreciation for the meaningful role that ACCP can play in an investigator's career. It is a distinct honor for me to serve the College as its Director of Research."

A board certified pharmacotherapy specialist, Dr. Marinac has been an active member of ACCP since 1986 and has served on ACCP committees, as a speaker in the cardiology section of the ACCP Pharmacotherapy Preparatory course, and as a contributor to ACCP publications. She has received numerous research grants, published regularly in peer-

reviewed journals, and frequently presented the results of her research at ACCP national meetings.

"We are thrilled to have Jacque joining the ACCP senior staff and leading the College's new research and investigator development efforts," noted ACCP Executive Director Michael Maddux. "She



brings a wealth of research and leadership experience to this position, both from an academic and a pharmaceutical industry perspective. In addition, as a longstanding member of the College, she shares our organizational and professional core values."

Pharmacy Technician Education, Training, and Certification:

A Key to the Advancement of Clinical Pharmacy

The issues surrounding the roles, responsibilities, education, training, and regulation of pharmacy technicians—even what to call this type of pharmacy "worker"—have challenged pharmacy for decades. There have been several recent efforts to generate consensus within the profession, such as the 1988 ASHP Invitational Conference, the 1992 APhA

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Stepping Stone Conference, and the 2003 Council on Credentialing in Pharmacy/ACPE Open Hearings. Even with periodic external stimuli such as the 2000 Institute of Medicine report "To Err is Human" and television exposes such as the April 2007 ABC News "20/20" investigative report on community pharmacy practice, a stubborn inertia continues at the present time. Pharmacy, essentially alone among the health professions, has failed to clearly articulate the necessary educational, credentialing, and scope of practice parameters that society can expect from the corps of technical personnel that function within the profession's various practice settings.

In its 2000 "white paper" on manpower needs² ACCP noted the "uneven preparation" of pharmacy technicians and called for the "recruitment and utilization of well-trained, nationally certified pharmacy technicians who can be deployed in appropriate dispensing roles, under pharmacist supervision." Since that time, changes in professional education (Pharm.D. as the sole professional degree) and practice opportunities (JCPP 2015 Vision for Pharmacy Practice³, medication therapy management services within Medicare Part D) have served to further advance the pharmacist's capabilities and involvement in patient care activities while still retaining overall accountability, and usually specific task responsibilities, for prescription order processing and fulfillment in most practice models.

Unfortunately, a similar evolution in the education, training, scope of practice, job responsibilities, and career opportunities has not occurred for pharmacy technicians during that same period. Without substantial reformation of the balance of responsibilities, accountabilities, tasks, and activities within the current and future model of pharmacy practice, neither pharmacists nor pharmacy technicians will be able to effectively and safely meet the full range of medication use and safety needs of the public they serve. In essence, without an expanded, professionally recognized, and standardized role for pharmacy technicians, the comprehensive delivery and impact of clinical pharmacy services is extremely unlikely to be achieved in most pharmacy practice settings.

In 2002, a jointly developed and published paper⁴ provided what remains the most complete and accurate assessment of the state of education, training, and regulation of pharmacy technicians. The paper calls for pharmacy's leadership to engage in specific discussions on pharmacy technicians in five key areas: (1) vision; (2) roles, responsibilities and competencies; (3) education and training; (4) credentialing and accreditation; and (5) regulation. Five years have passed with essentially no organized effort within the profession to advance its thinking and action in this important area.

Despite this lack of professional dialogue and consensus on the education, training, and scope of practice vision for pharmacy technicians, tremendous growth has in fact occurred in the past 5 years in the number of technicians certified by the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board (PTCB). More than 200,000 individuals have now been certified by PTCB since its inception in 1995, a number that is almost equal to the number of pharmacists in the U.S. This suggests a marketplace phenomenon that has the potential (if it hasn't already) of overwhelming the discussion

on the other, equally critical, issues identified in the 2002 white paper.

Although ACCP supports and applauds the increased visibility and utilization of PTCB certification, and understands that many technicians currently in practice have significant work-related experience and training that prepared them to be successfully certified, substantial work remains to be done in the other identified areas of pharmacy technician education and training to help ensure an appropriately educated and prepared technical work force in pharmacy now and in the future.

As a result of the leadership of ACCP President Stuart Haines and recent discussions within the Council on Credentialing in Pharmacy, the Board of Regents has adopted the following position statement to make explicit the views of the organization on the issues identified in the 2002 white paper on pharmacy technicians. The board also expresses its commitment to working collaboratively with other interested stakeholders to achieve changes in these key areas that will align with the position and vision of the College in advancing the role of clinical pharmacists in improving the quality, safety, and effectiveness of medication use.

Indeed, ACCP believes that the widespread and successful provision of clinical pharmacy services in all settings of care will require a significant realignment and expansion of the practice activities of both pharmacists <u>and</u> pharmacy technicians. The necessary changes articulated by Dr. Linwood Tice, the visionary pharmacy educator, more than 40 years ago can wait no longer:

"The counting and pouring now often alleged to be the pharmacist's chief occupation will in time be done by technicians and eventually by automation. The pharmacist of tomorrow will function by reason of what he knows, increasing the efficiency and safety of drug therapy and working as a specialist in his own right."

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Position Statement

Pharmacy Technician Education, Training, and Certification

Terminology:

The American College of Clinical Pharmacy (ACCP) supports the use of the term "pharmacy technician" <u>only</u> for those persons in a pharmacy practice setting who:

- are authorized by both state regulation and employment status to engage in one or more steps in the process of fulfillment of a prescription or medication order;
- have successfully completed an education and training program that is accredited by a nationally recognized accrediting body: and
- are certified by the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board (PTCB).

Education & Training:

ACCP supports the accreditation process for pharmacy technician education and training programs administered by the Commission on Credentialing of the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP). Further, ACCP supports a planned, timely transition for the responsibility and process of accreditation of pharmacy technician education and training programs from ASHP to the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education.

ACCP supports the use and ongoing refinement of a nationally recognized and standardized model curriculum for all new pharmacy technicians that provides core knowledge, skills, and attitudes delivered through a process of both didactic instruction and practice-based learning experiences.

ACCP supports an expanded role for colleges and schools of pharmacy in the development, standardization, and validation of pharmacy technician education and training programs and encourages their active involvement in facilitating team-based learning opportunities for student pharmacists and student pharmacy technicians.

Certification:

ACCP supports the certification program of the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board and urges its adoption as a required component of the process of credentialing of pharmacy technicians by state and federal regulatory bodies.

Practice Activities:

ACCP supports changes in pharmacy practice regulations that would authorize a system by which pharmacy technicians may engage in a "technician-check-technician" process for prescription/medication order fulfillment. This process must be performed in an integrated fashion with the provision of clinical services, patient education, and patient and health care provider consultation activities by pharmacists that promote the effective and safe use of the medication being dispensed.


ACCP supports limiting persons who are authorized to be involved in the process of fulfillment of prescription or medication orders (or other appropriate medication-related patient care activities) to personnel who are pharmacists, student pharmacists engaged in introductory and advanced practice experiences of their professional degree program, pharmacy technicians, or student pharmacy technicians.

Licensure and Registration:

ACCP supports the public health and safety role of state boards of pharmacy and encourages the implementation of enhanced, nationally uniform registration and/or licensure procedures for pharmacy technicians that are based on and consistent with the education, training, and certification principles outlined in this position statement.

College Releases How to Develop a Business Plan for Pharmacy Services



Recipients of 2007 Frontiers Career Development Research Awards

Again this year, the ACCP Research Institute will provide more than \$500,000 dollars in support of clinical pharmacy research and researcher development. Thanks to the generous contributions to the College's Frontiers Fund by nearly 700 ACCP members, several PRNs, and others, this total includes more than \$205,000 in support of this year's Frontiers Career Development Research Awards.

Congratulations to the following 2007 award recipients:

Pharmacodynamic Effects of Low-Dose Pioglitazone in the Metabolic Syndrome—Christina L. Aquilante, Pharm.D.; University of Colorado at Denver. The aim of this study is to provide a comprehensive pharmacodynamic assessment of alternative, and safer, TZD dosing regimes for use in high-risk nondiabetic individuals. These investigators hypothesize that low-dose pioglitazone will increase levels of the protective adipocyte-derived cytokine, adiponectin, decrease C-reactive protein levels, and have favorable effects on components of the metabolic syndrome (e.g., insulin sensitivity) in this population.

HIV Positive Women's Interactions With Pharmacy Systems – Jennifer M. Cocohoba, Pharm.D.; University of California in San Francisco. Patients with chronic diseases such as HIV/AIDS are at risk of having adverse pharmacy experiences and may be more likely to experience medication errors, privacy violations and drug interactions due to their medication regimes. This will be a nested cohort study within the well-established Women's Interagency HIV Study. It aims to determine how HIV infection influences general patterns of pharmacy use and pharmaceutical care experiences and to evaluate when selected pharmacy use patterns are associated with virologic and adherence outcomes.

Effects of Female Hormones on Hepatic Drug Metabolism: Clinical Implication During Pregnancy –

Hyunyoung Jeong, Pharm.D., PhD.; University of Illinois at Chicago. Hypothesizing that hormones elevated during pregnancy (estrogen and progesterone) modulate expression of hepatic drug metabolizing enzymes, leading to altered hepatic elimination of drugs, the primary goal of this study is to establish a firm link between the female hormones and altered hepatic elimination of drugs in in-vitro systems and to predict altered pharmacokinetics of drugs during pregnancy using human hepatocytes.

Evaluation of a Novel Charcoal Cookie – Wendy Klein-Schwartz, Pharm.D., MPH; University of Maryland.

Activated charcoal is most effective in the management of poisonings if administered within one hour of toxin ingestion, but its use in the home is limited by the charcoal slurry's poor palatability. A novel activated charcoal cookie preparation has recently been formulated, and it is this study's aim to determine the relative effect on the absorption of orally administered cimetidine in healthy subjects and to assess the palatability of the charcoal cookie.

Sympathetic Modulation of Outward Rectifier Currents During Atrial Fibrillation – *Brian R. Overholser*, *Pharm.D.; Purdue University*. The hypothesis is that atrial vulnerability is attenuated by dual I(Ks) and I(Kur) inhibition during sympathetic stimulation following atrial fibrillation. This study will provide fundamental physiological information on the interplay of the outward rectifier currents during adrenergic stimulation, leading to pharmacological strategies to improve AF treatment.

fMRI Imaged Neuroactivation and Craving in Alcoholics Is Modulated by Ondansetron – *Daniel P. Wermeling, Pharm.D.; University of Kentucky.* This multidisciplinary study will determine whether pharmacologic functional Magnetic Resonance Imaging (fMRI) can be a tool to measure cue-induced neuroactivation and alcohol craving in alcoholics, and to determine whether the intravenous (IV) probe medication ondansetron (OND) can acutely modulate these biomarkers.

LXRA Gene Polymorphisms and Response to Fenofibrate

Issam Zineh, Pharm.D.; University of Florida.
 Cardiovascular disease (CVD) exacts tremendous clinical, economic, and humanistic tolls worldwide. Substantial evidence indicates that abnormal lipoprotein levels and inflammation are linked to CVD pathogenesis. This study proposes to identify whether 1) genetic variability in NR1H3 contributes to variable lipoprotein or anti-inflammatory response to fenofibrate; and 2) novel fenofibrate immunomodulatory effects can be demonstrated ex vivo or in vitro, and to what extent these are LXRA-dependent.
