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TLCP 2012 Spring Programming

The spring sessions of the Teaching and Learning Certificate Program 2012 will be held Sunday and Monday, April 29 and 30, at the Peppermill Resort in Reno, Nevada.

The programming is conveniently structured so that participants can attend two required modules and two electives within a 2-day period.

On Sunday, April 29 (8:00 a.m.–noon), we will offer module 1: Planning for Effective Teaching. The 8-hour program in Basic Training is a prerequisite.

On Monday, April 30 (8:00 a.m.–noon), we will offer module 3: Assessing Student Learning. Module 2, Implementing Teaching and Learning Strategies, is a prerequisite.

Both electives invite participants to come prepared to present and receive feedback on their teaching strategies.



Elective 1

The first elective, "Active Learning: What Works and What Doesn't," is presented by Brenda Gleason, Pharm.D., from1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. on Sunday.

This participant-driven elective will invite attendees to share their successes and problems with implementing active learning in didactic and experiential environments. You are encouraged to bring novel active learning strategies/materials to demonstrate during the session. (The session room will be equipped with a laptop and projection screen if you wish to share your active learning strategy, or you can bring hard copies of active learning strategy materials.)

Other participants will be asked to offer suggestions for improvement. An overview of active e-learning and

additional active learning practice opportunities will also be provided. This will be a great opportunity to learn to identify and resolve pitfalls related to particular active learning strategies from your peers. In addition, you will develop an arsenal of active learning tools and techniques that foster student engagement in learning and reinforce the achievement of intended course objectives or outcomes.

Elective 2



On Sunday, from 3:45 p.m. to 5:45 p.m., Zachary Stacy, Pharm.D., BCPS, and Andrew Crannage, Pharm.D., will present "Experiential Teaching: Transitioning from Books to Bedside Learning."



In this 2-hour interactive session, Drs. Stacy and Crannage will lead participants through an interactive workshop designed for successful precepting in the clinical setting. They will present general strategies to assist in the education of students transitioning

from the classroom to the clinical setting.

Unique difficulties present themselves in the experiential setting, especially for new preceptors. During this session, these professional struggles will be discussed. Participants will be asked to share personal experiences in this setting and strategies that have been successful in balancing preceptor and practitioner roles.

The presents will discuss strategies for effectively and efficiently precepting students and residents at various stages of learning. One strategy that will be discussed is the creation of synergy between resident and student experiences to streamline the learning process. Instances

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of both direct patient and non-patient care activities will be shared. Participants are asked to think about and come prepared to discuss activities they currently perform in their practice. In addition, participants are asked to begin thinking about additional opportunities that may be present.

The participant will create his or her own learning activities while assessing peers and providing feedback on other activities. In both discussion and practice, the presenters will emphasize the importance of the criteria needed to enhance learning opportunities in the experiential setting.

Teaching Critical Thinking?

Critical thinking is one of the most common and most important outcomes within higher education. Most instructors say they teach critical thinking. However, it is not always easy for them to describe how they teach it. Answering some questions can perhaps help.



- What does critical thinking mean in your discipline/ course/practice experience? What is the clear, specific critical thinking ability outcome for your students?
- What specifically do you practice in your teaching to promote critical thinking?
- What specifically do your students engage in to practice the type of critical thinking you have specified?
- Where specifically in your assessments is critical thinking evaluated?
- Is critical thinking identified and defined on peer-, self-, and expert assessment forms?
- When and where do you provide assessment feedback to critical thinking?

It could be useful to review previous course syllabi and assessments to determine whether critical thinking is given the attention that most believe essential for educated citizens and practitioners.
