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Call for Nominations

Nominations for the 2015 "New" Awards (New Clinical Practitioner, New Educator, and New Investigator), 2015 Parker Medal, and 2015 ACCP Fellows (FCCPs) are now open and must be submitted by February 15, 2015. All nomination materials, including letters, curricula vitae or resumes, and other supporting documents, can be submitted online to ACCP. The online nominations portal specifies the nominating materials required for each award and honor. This portal is available at http://www.accp.com/membership/nominations.aspx.

2015 ACCP Fellows: Fellowship is awarded in recognition of continued excellence in clinical pharmacy practice or research. Nominees must have been Full Members of ACCP for at least 5 years, must have been in practice for at least 10 years since receipt of their highest professional pharmacy degree, and must have made a sustained contribution to ACCP through activities such as presentation at College meetings; service to ACCP committees, PRNs, chapters, or publications; or election as an officer. Candidates must be nominated by any two Full Members other than the nominee, by any Fellow, or by any member of the Board of Regents. Current members of the Board of Regents, Research Institute Board of Trustees, Pharmacotherapy Board of Directors, or Credentials: FCCP Committee are ineligible for consideration. Nomination deadline: February 15, 2015.

2015 Paul F. Parker Medal for Distinguished Service to the Profession of Pharmacy: Recognizes an individual who has made outstanding and sustained contributions to improving or expanding the profession of pharmacy in an area of professional service including, but not limited to, patient care, leadership, administration, finance, technology, information processing, service delivery, models of care, and advocacy. The award is not limited to pharmacists or ACCP members. All nominations must consist of a letter detailing the nominee's qualifications for this award and his or her contributions to the profession of pharmacy; the nominee's curriculum vitae, resume, or biographical sketch as available; and a minimum of three letters of recommendation. At least one of these letters must be from an individual outside the nominee's current practice locale. Current members of the Board of Regents, Research Institute Board of Trustees, *Pharmacotherapy* Board of Directors, Parker Medal Selection Committee, or ACCP staff are ineligible. Nomination deadline: February 15, 2015.

2015 New Clinical Practitioner Award: This award recognizes a new clinical practitioner who has made

outstanding contributions to the health of patients and/or the practice of clinical pharmacy. Nominees must have been Full Members of ACCP at the time of nomination and members at any level for a minimum of 3 years. In addition, nominees must have completed their terminal pharmacy training or degree (whichever is most recent) within the past 6 years. Fellows of ACCP (i.e., "FCCPs") are ineligible. All nominations must include a letter of nomination from an ACCP member detailing the nominee's qualifications for the award, the nominee's curriculum vitae, and two letters of support (also from ACCP members) that describe the individual's accomplishments relative to the award criteria. At least one of the letters of support must be from an individual outside the nominee's current place of employment. Additional letters of support also may be included, including letters from non-ACCP members. Self nominations are not permitted. Current members of the Board of Regents, Awards Committee, or ACCP staff are ineligible. Nomination deadline: February 15, 2015.

2015 New Educator Award: This award recognizes and honors a new educator for outstanding contributions to the discipline of teaching and to the education of health care practitioners. Nominees must have been Full Members of ACCP at the time of nomination and members at any level for a minimum of 3 years. In addition, nominees must have completed their terminal pharmacy training or degree (whichever is most recent) within the past 6 years. Fellows of ACCP (i.e., "FCCPs") are ineligible. All nominations must include a letter of nomination from an ACCP member detailing the nominee's qualifications for the award, the nominee's curriculum vitae, and two letters of support (also from ACCP members) that describe the individual's accomplishments relative to the award criteria. At least one of the letters of support must be from an individual outside the nominee's current place of employment. Additional letters of support also may be included, including letters from non-ACCP members. Self nominations are not permitted. Current members of the Board of Regents, Awards Committee, or ACCP staff are ineligible. Nomination deadline: February 15, 2015.

2015 New Investigator Award: The purpose of this award is to highlight the research program of an ACCP member who has made a major impact on an aspect of clinical pharmaceutical science. Nominees must have been at the time of nomination members

of ACCP for more than 3 years; they must have a research program with a significant publication record having a programmatic theme or an especially noteworthy single publication; and it must have been less than 6 years since completion of their terminal training or degree, whichever is most recent. Fellows of ACCP (i.e., "FCCPs") are ineligible. All nominations must include a letter of nomination from an ACCP member detailing the nominee's qualifications for the award, the nominee's curriculum vitae, and two

letters of support (also from ACCP members) that describe the individual's accomplishments relative to the award criteria. At least one of the letters of support must be from an individual outside the nominee's current place of employment. Additional letters of support also may be included, including letters from non-ACCP members. Self nominations are not permitted. Current members of the Board of Regents, Awards Committee, or ACCP staff are ineligible. Nomination deadline: February 15, 2015.

President's Column

Practice Transformation— Show Us the Data

As we start the New Year, most of us have at least a small amount of optimistic anticipation of the events and activities that lie ahead both professionally and personally. I share that positive view of potential events as we consider the prospect of elevating the stature of pharmacists as key providers in the health care realm. We may also have some trepidation regarding the unknown that awaits us, recognizing that the inertia that has plagued the government may persist. Even though ACCP will continue to collaborate with legislators, individual clinical pharmacists should focus on the factors within our own spheres of influence.

We are looking for formal recognition of the contributions we make every day. For my practice in a critical care setting, it is difficult to measure my contributions. I focus extensively on preventing poor outcomes and find it difficult to measure what I have prevented through my patient-focused interactions—reducing bacterial resistance through good antimicrobial stewardship, maximizing response through dosing individualization, and avoiding expenses or adverse reactions by discontinuing unneeded medications and laboratory tests. As members of the care team, we all take credit for positive outcomes. We measure costs per case and lengths of stay and survival indices for our patients. But how do I prove my individual impact as a member of the team?

Similar challenges exist in the outpatient setting, but in some ways, the opportunity to create new practices and transform existing practices may better allow us to take a fresh perspective and proactively design data collection into these new activities. Even though the outcomes data are not as concrete as our administrators may desire, resources such as the Lessons Learned from Six Minnesota Health Systems on Integrating

Medication Management are required reading (see http://z.umn.edu/mncasestudies). These case studies of practice transformation focus on key topics, including how external influences and recognition of pharmacists as an untapped resource can be used and how the initiation of Part D services for eligible patients led to broader activities and comprehensive medication management (CMM). Illustrating this opportunity, a summary of medication therapy management (MTM) services shows that although 25% of Medicare Part D beneficiaries were eligible for MTM, only 11% of all Part D enrollees were part of a program in 2012, and only 1% had received a comprehensive medication review (see http:// www.avalere.com/expertise/managed-care/insights/ few-medicare-beneficiaries-receive-comprehensivemedication-management-serv). Eligible patients had at least two chronic conditions, were taking at least three medications, and reported medication expenses of more than \$3100 annually. For the top 10 Part D plans, enrollment rates ranged from 4.6% to 17.5%. Although a variety of new models for chronic care are emerging, it is clear that significant opportunities remain for pharmacists to initiate MTM services at a minimum and CMM as a standard. Maximizing the pharmacist's value to patients eligible for Part D services may be a stepping-stone to Medicare recognition of CMM as advocated by ACCP.

Regardless of progress on the Part D front, we must seek to measure the impact of CMM (as deployed in teambased, patient-centered care settings) on patient outcomes and medical costs and seek the collaboration of key insurers and other stakeholders in doing so. Team-based care, collaborative practice agreements, quality measurements, and shared accountability are factors cited in the previously mentioned case studies from Minnesota. Although internal result reporting can help support expanded pharmacist services, external reporting is clearly needed, as shown in a recent review of MTM services (see Viswanathan M, Kahwati LC, Golin CE, et al. Medication therapy management interventions in outpatient settings. JAMA Intern Med 2015;175:76-87.). In this review, evidence was insufficient for most health outcomes of interest, given the heterogeneity of the patient populations cared for and the inconsistency and imprecision of the clinical interventions used. Indeed, those working in health systems looking for an impact of MTM on hospital admission rates may be disappointed after reviewing these data. To address these insufficiencies, the authors called for future research to control for the underlying variabilities in populations, interventions, and outcome measures.


Although more proof of the clinical pharmacist's contributions to the care team is needed, some evidence is emerging. A study of hypertension management with a care team showed that the addition of a pharmacist alone,

or a pharmacist and a nurse, led to a median of 22% and 16% of patients with controlled blood pressure, respectively, compared with 12% in the overall population (see Proia KK, Thota AB, Njie GJ, et al. Team-based care and improved blood pressure control: a community guide systematic review. Am J Prev Med 2014;47:86-99). Key design features included the ability of team members to make independent changes to medications or to make recommendations and implement changes after provider approval.

New support for transformative initiatives has been made available to clinicians through the Affordable Care Act. The Transforming Clinical Practice Initiative launched by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services will facilitate the transition to value-based, patient-centered, and coordinated health care services (see http:// innovation.cms.gov/initiatives/Transforming-Clinical-Practices/). I am hopeful that the groups selected to participate in this program will help develop tools and mechanisms that can better document and measure the contributions of clinical pharmacists with respect to improved patient outcomes, cost savings, and avoidance of hospitalizations. Although this program will offer technical assistance and expertise from networks of clinicians and other stakeholders, ongoing support for the transformation of practices is also a high-priority initiative for ACCP.

Bottom line: there is an urgent need to demonstrate how clinical pharmacists improve the care of patients and meaningfully affect medication-related outcomes in patient-centered, team-based settings. Toward that end, let's take a fresh look now at generating meaningful evidence of the value of CMM.

Dr. Michael Gillette is a clinical pharmacy specialist in cardiology at the Michael E. DeBakey VA Medical Center in Houston, Texas. Many people and moments in his life have influenced his career in numerous ways, but his brother first introduced the profession of pharmacy to him, and

his undergraduate chemistry professors were also instrumental in supporting and preparing him for pharmacy school. He attended Nova Southeastern University College of Pharmacy, where many faculty and preceptors helped him grow professionally and encouraged him to consider pursuing residency training. After graduation, he first gained valuable experience working as a clinical/staff pharmacist for 2 years in the VA setting before completing an accredited PGY1 pharmacy practice residency with an emphasis in acute care and a 2-year postdoctoral fellowship in cardiology at the North Florida/South Georgia Veterans Health System. He is a recent graduate of the ACCP Research and Scholarship Academy and is board certified in both pharmacotherapy and ambulatory care pharmacy.

grow and evolve. He notes that while in school, he never thought he would eventually be practicing in cardiology, and although concepts didn't make sense in school, he was fortunate to have the opportunity after graduating to practice under clinical pharmacists and physicians who were able to fill in the missing gaps in an area that was so perplexing at first but then just fell into place. He commented, "Sometimes, you learn from the positive experiences and sometimes the negative, but the great thing is that you learn. Take the opportunity to look back on your mistakes and self-reflect so that you don't repeat them." One thing that has helped him significantly is his experience in networking with others to seek advice, ideas, and even encouragement when necessary. "A good mentor," he

recounts, "is certainly worth his/her weight in gold. Work hard in all that you do; nothing good ever came to those who didn't put forth the effort or ever try." Finally, he advises hopeful clinical pharmacists to find an area within pharmacy that is enjoyable because, as he says, "you'll be doing it for a long time and you'll be successful at doing things that you enjoy. Most of all, great things happen as a generous response to prayer."

Gillette also credits a few others as helpful influences: the numerous patients he has encountered, who have given him necessary experience and both positive and negative feedback; his family and friends, who have been a longitudinal cord of support; and lastly, God, who has graciously coordinated everything that has led him to where he is today.


