The ACCP Foundation has been supporting pharmacy researcher development and pharmacy research

advancement through the ACCP Futures Grants for 10 years. With the first grants awarded in 2015, we have an opportunity to reflect on the impact of these mentored developmental research awards. Many have used Futures Grants to gather preliminary data that went on to support a larger grant application. Others credit the Futures Grant application process and award as being fundamental in directing them to a career in research.

Rachael Stone, clinical pharmacist at UVA Health, research assistant professor at University of Virginia, and principal investigator of an American Heart Association grant, credits the Futures Grant she was awarded as a PGY1 resident in 2021 as being pivotal to her research career. "It has led me down a career path that I don't think I would have discovered otherwise."

In recognition of the need for larger grant award amounts, the ACCP Foundation Board of Directors has approved increased funding for individual Junior and Student/Resident awards, up to \$80,000 for a junior investigator and up to \$20,000 for a student or resident investigator grant. Call for Applications for the ACCP Professional Leadership Development Program

Applications for the 2025-2026 cohort for the ACCP Professional Leadership Development (APLD) program are now being accepted. The APLD program is designed to provide members with an opportunity to learn leadership principles within the framework of ACCP governance through the perspectives of both elected leaders and staff. Led by Directors Miranda Andrus, Pharm.D., FCCP, BCPS, and Marcia Buck, Pharm.D., FCCP, FPPA, BCPPS, together with established leaders within ACCP who serve as faculty and mentors, APLD will prepare participants for service as leaders within ACCP as well as the pharmacy profession.

The program will begin with an in-person session during the 2025 ACCP Annual Meeting in Minneapolis, Minnesota, October 18 to 21, followed by 1 or 2 interactive 1-hour virtual sessions per month consisting of leadership topics and group discussions. It will be focused on ACCP core values and build on established leadership principles, including those from leadership texts used by the ACCP Board of Regents, which will then be reinforced and practiced through participation in the virtual sessions and capstone projects. The content will be divided into 4 sections:

Creating a Leadership Foundation: Self-Discovery and Team-Building will begin with an in-person session to introduce participants to the program and provide them with the opportunity to meet their mentors and the members of their capstone project group while discovering how their strengths benefit them as leaders. Subsequent virtual sessions will include a discussion of the leadership tools used by the Board of Regents.

- Leadership within ACCP: Structure and Governance will focus on ACCP's history, core values, mission, and strategic plan. Participants will learn about ACCP's responsibilities as a professional association, compare the focus and governance of the 2 Boards within ACCP, and review the process for creating a strategic plan.
- Leading Teams and Change Management will build on the teachings in the first 2 sections to examine the traits necessary to provide organizational leadership and advance clinical pharmacy as a profession.
- Leading a Professional Association will focus on the participant's role in leading a professional association and working with both staff and volunteer members. Participants will discuss the differences in leadership in the workplace, associations, and community as part of the process for developing the knowledge and skills needed to serve in leadership roles.

APLD members will also work in groups to complete capstone projects, assisting ACCP in achieving initiatives from the current strategic plan while also their honing leadership skills. These projects will be presented during a special session at the 2026 ACCP Annual Meeting in Salt Lake City to APLD members, faculty, and mentors, as well as members of the ACCP Board of Regents, senior staff, and members of the incoming APLD class. After the capstone presentations, members successfully completing the program will receive program certificates.

Associate and full members of ACCP who have served in an ACCP leadership position (eg, PRN officer or PRN committee chair, state or regional chapter officer or committee chair, ACCP committee chair or vice chair) or who hold a leadership role in their workplace and are interested in pursuing future opportunities, including elected office or other appointed roles in ACCP, are encouraged to apply. The program is provided without cost; however, participants will be responsible for obtaining the 3 books used in the program and for the costs associated with attending 2 ACCP Annual Meetings (2025 and 2026). The APLD application consists of a current curriculum vitae and a letter of intent

focusing on the applicant's leadership experience and future goals. Applications must be submitted by June 1, 2025. Applicants will be notified of acceptance on or before August 1, 2025. For questions about the ACCP Professional Leadership Development program, please email accp@accp.com.

2025 ACCP Clinical Pharmacy Challenge: Team Registration Deadline September 1

ACCP's novel pharmacy student team competition returns for its 16th season. The ACCP Clinical Pharmacy Challenge offers eligible teams the opportunity to compete in up to 4 online rounds, with the top 8 teams in 2025 advancing to the live quarterfinal competition at the ACCP Annual Meeting in Minneapolis, Minnesota, October 18 to 21. Team registration is now available online. Plan now to participate this fall.

Competition Overview

The ACCP Clinical Pharmacy Challenge is a team-based competition in which teams of 3 students compete against teams from other schools and colleges of pharmacy in a "quiz bowl"—type format. Only 1 team per institution can enter the competition. Institutions with branch campuses, distance satellites, and/or several interested teams are encouraged to conduct a local competition. ACCP provides a local competition exam that institutions can use in selecting their team. Faculty members interested in using the exam can send an email request to Michelle Kucera, Pharm.D., BCPS, at mkucera@accp.com.

Preliminary rounds of the 2025 national competition will be conducted virtually in September. The quarter-final, semifinal, and final rounds will be held live at the 2025 ACCP Annual Meeting in Minneapolis.

Each round will consist of questions offered in the 3 distinct segments indicated below. Item content used in each segment has been developed and reviewed by an expert panel of clinical pharmacy practitioners and educators.

- Trivia/Lightning
- Clinical Case
- Jeopardy-style




Each team advancing to the quarterfinal round held at the ACCP Annual Meeting will receive 3 complimentary student full-meeting registrations. Each team member will receive an ACCP gift certificate for \$125 and a certificate of recognition. In addition, semifinal teams not advancing to the final round will receive a semifinal team plaque for display at their institution. The second-place team will receive a \$750 cash award (\$250 to each member) and a commemorative team plaque. The winning team will receive a \$1500 cash award (\$500 to each member), and each team member will receive a commemorative plaque. A team trophy will be awarded to the winning institution.

Students are not required to be members of ACCP to participate. Team registration may be submitted online and must be initiated by a current faculty member at the respective institution. Students interested in forming a team should contact their ACCP <u>faculty liaison</u>. If no ACCP faculty liaison has been identified, any faculty member from the institution may initiate the registration process. The registering faculty member must confirm the eligibility of all team members and/or alternates online before a team will be permitted to compete in the Clinical Pharmacy Challenge. The deadline to complete team registration and confirm eligibility for the 2025 Clinical Pharmacy Challenge is September 1, 2025.

ACCP Member Spotlight: Emily Hanners Dunn



Emily Hanners Dunn, Pharm.D., BCPS, is a clinical assistant professor at the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC) Retzky College of Pharmacy. She earned her Pharm.D. degree from UIC Retzky College of Pharmacy, where she also completed a postgraduate acute care

pharmacy practice residency and earned teaching and research certificates.

In her current position, Hanners is responsible for maintaining scholarly and service activities, which include didactic and experiential teaching, research, clinical service, and national/state/local organization involvement. In addition to her academic role, she practices as an internal medicine clinical pharmacist at the University of Illinois Hospital. In the experiential setting, she is a preceptor for pharmacy students and residents alike. Reflecting on her own pharmacy journey, Hanners' passion for precepting began with a past preceptor who changed the trajectory of her career path:

This preceptor took the time to tell me how much potential they saw in me early in my fourth-year rotations and reassured me that I would make a great clinical pharmacist one day. Until that moment, I had questioned my abilities and didn't have the confidence I needed to apply to residencies. This preceptor dedicated countless hours to building my

fundamental clinical pharmacy skills that I still credit to them to this day.

The preceptor, she states, continues to build confidence in her trainees through serving as a "mentor to my students and helping them navigate the many decisions and emotions that come with P4 year."

Within ACCP, Hanners serves as a leader in the Adult Medicine PRN, where she is currently the vice chair of the Communications Committee. She encourages ACCP members to:

Engage your learners (students and residents) with their PRN of interest, encourage them to sign up for a clinical pearls, grand rounds, or journal club presentation within the PRN with the patient case or journal club that they already completed on your rotation. This not only enhances participation from learners in the PRNs but also builds a mentorship/trust between you and the learner. Lastly, I encourage you to forward travel award grants to learners that you think are interested in attending an ACCP Annual Meeting. The future generation of pharmacists and ACCP members are our current learners and ACCP provides a network of opportunities for all.

To incorporate advocacy into her daily practice, Hanners applies her experience from growing up in a rural, small town where access to health care and pharmacies was scarce. She takes pride in her transition of care practices, ensuring patients have access to necessary medications. She continues to advocate for the profession of pharmacy and encourages learners to do the same:

I think it is important for me to be involved and advocate for our fight for provider status, but I think it is equally important to help fight with my colleagues even if it may not directly impact my job. I try to keep our patients in mind and understand that regulatory and legislative decisions made at any level affecting our field directly impact our patients.

In addition to her advocacy efforts while educating and mentoring the next generation of pharmacists, Hanners is excited for her next adventure welcoming a baby boy to her family in April!

ACCP Member Spotlight: Laura Sjoquist



Laura K. Sjoquist, Pharm.D., BSPS, is a behavioral health clinical pharmacist practitioner at the James E. Van Zandt Veterans Affairs (VA) Medical Center in Altoona, Pennsylvania. She also serves as an adjunct professor in the Bowling Green State University Doctor of Physical

Therapy Program, where she teaches pharmacology. Sjoquist earned both her BS degree in pharmaceutical sciences and her Pharm.D. degree from Cedarville University College of Pharmacy in 2015 and 2018, respectively. After graduation, she completed a 2-year Experiential Programs Academic Fellowship at the University of North Carolina (UNC) Eshelman School of Pharmacy under the direction of Dr. Nicole Pinelli Reitter. For several years after her fellowship, Sjoquist served as an assistant professor of teaching in pharmacy practice at the University of Findlay in Findlay, Ohio. She transitioned to her current role at the VA in early 2024.

Growing up, Sjoquist observed family members facing serious mental health diagnoses who struggled with polypharmacy and overprescription of psychotropic medications. These experiences, combined with encouragement from teachers and a local pharmacist, prompted her to pursue her Pharm.D. degree. Given this background, it might seem clear that Sjoquist would end up practicing in behavioral health, but less evident is the fact that her story is full of mentors and unique opportunities that informed her journey. Sjoguist's responses to her Member Spotlight nomination mentioned more than 10 mentors by name as she expressed gratitude for their investment in her—a legacy she reflects on often. Competing as a collegiate NCAA Division II pentathlete and heptathlete gave Sjoquist a chance to serve as a student athlete on the NCAA Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects in Sports Committee. This committee exposed her to the research process and its contributions to advancing clinical practice. Her practical experience with research, teaching, and clinical psychiatric pharmacy practice continued during her fellowship at UNC. A volunteer opportunity with the Autism Society of North Carolina (ASNC) during fellowship turned into

a personal passion and vested interest in patients and families living with autism spectrum disorder. She continues to work remotely as a clinical pharmacist human rights committee member for ASNC.

In her current role, Sjoquist provides comprehensive medication management services to veterans living with diagnosed mental health and substance use disorders, including ambulatory alcohol detoxification. Functioning within her privileged scope of practice, she autonomously prescribes and monitors psychiatric medication therapy for veterans through face-to-face and telehealth ambulatory care appointments. Sjoquist is a core team member within the Behavioral Health Interdisciplinary Program, serving on committees and teams dedicated to medication overdose awareness, mental health grand rounds, and substance use disorders. Sjoquist maintains active involvement in research and scholarship activities that she hopes will ultimately enhance the care provided to veterans. Clearly a dedicated pharmacist, Sjoquist reminds others, "You are more than a pharmacist. Invest in both your personal and professional interests with vigor."

Sjoquist was encouraged to get involved with ACCP early in her fellowship, and over time, it has become her professional home. When asked about advocacy, she equates advocacy to her daily practice, where she uses each interaction to talk about what pharmacists bring to the table to meet the needs of patients. She provides the following tip for individuals looking to incorporate advocacy into their daily practice:

Approach the conversation inversely, highlighting the things you do in your job and the people you serve before classifying [your]self as a pharmacist. Find common ground and identify what other people care about so that you can frame the profession accordingly.

Sjoquist encourages other pharmacists to share their impact. "It's not just the numerical data, which are there, that speak to our value," she said. "People need to hear our stories." One final lesson from Sjoquist's story is that change takes time. Exposure to advocacy through student professional pharmacy organization events talking

about provider status in Ohio started her multiyear process of networking with mental health advocates and providers in Findlay, Ohio. The outcome of these years of hard work and patience? Sjoquist launched the first behavioral health clinical pharmacist collaborative practice with long-acting injectable medication services in the area. Change needs champions.

Washington Report Standing Up for Clinical Pharmacy on Capitol Hill: ACCP DC-Area Chapter Annual Advocacy Day

On March 27, 2025, ACCP's Government Affairs office welcomed clinical pharmacists from the DC-Area College of Clinical



Pharmacy for the Annual Capitol Hill Lobby Day. Thank you to our volunteer leaders from D.C., Maryland, and Virginia for making this exciting event possible! Building on our experience holding virtual lobby days during the pandemic, the 2025 event was made available to members as an in-person/virtual hybrid effort.

Our group was led by Lisa Peters, Pharm.D., clinical specialist pharmacist, Advanced Heart Failure and Heart Transplant at MedStar Washington Hospital Center. Peters received her Pharm.D. degree from the University of Michigan College of Pharmacy and completed her pharmacy practice residency at the Richmond Veterans Affairs Medical Center. Peters is a former president of the DC College of Clinical Pharmacy and has organized the DCCCP Advocacy Day on Capitol Hill for more than 10 years.

The DCCCP represents members from across the Washington metropolitan area, including the District of Columbia, Maryland, and Virginia. On the Wednesday evening before the event, the group convened an online training and preparatory session to ensure all attendees were fully briefed.

The group then met in person on the first morning of the event at ACCP's Washington, D.C., offices for an overview of ACCP's advocacy platform, the current legislative environment, and the congressional lobbying process. Our group included student pharmacists from the Howard University and Virginia Commonwealth University schools of pharmacy. Putting our message of collaboration into advocacy practice, we were pleased to welcome Tiffany Tseng, Pharm.D., representing the Washington Metropolitan Society of Health-System Pharmacists.

From there, we made our way up Pennsylvania Avenue NW to enjoy lunch at the cafeteria in the Rayburn House Office Building on Capitol Hill before meeting with Rep. Jamie Raskin (D-MD) and Sen. Chris Van Hollen (D-MD).

Although staff in these offices are already familiar with ACCP's advocacy priorities, the importance of directly engaging these active ACCP members in the political process cannot be replicated, whether in D.C. or back home when Congress is in recess.

Consistent with ACCP's advocacy priorities, our lobbying visits focused on ACCP's efforts to establish Medicare coverage for comprehensive clinical pharmacy services as part of a broader reform of Medicare payment policy. In addition, we urged elected officials to cosponsor legislation to protect critical federal funding for pharmacy and nursing residency programs. The Rebuild America's Health Care Schools Act of 2025 (S. 1087, H.R. 1708) would clarify the requirements that hospitals and health systems meet to receive Medicare reimbursement for operating health care residency programs and require CMS to cover ALL direct and indirect costs associated with the training of a nursing and allied

health education participant—including pharmacy residents—incurred by a hospital participating program.

ACCP would like to thank the leadership of the DC Chapter for their hard work and commitment to ACCP's advocacy agenda. 2025 ACCP Clinical Research Challenge: Round 3: Research Proposal Submission Underway



ACCP is pleased to announce that competition is underway in the 2025 Clinical Research Challenge (CRC). Research and scholarship contributes to improved health outcomes for patients and advances in the profession of

clinical pharmacy. Critically evaluating and applying primary literature is an essential skill for students pursuing a career in clinical pharmacy.

This innovative and unique competition offers teams of 3 students (those in the first 2 professional years of their degree program) the opportunity to compete in and advance through 3 rounds of competition. The competition began February 10 with 79 teams participating in Round 1: Online Journal Club.

Teams who achieved the top 40 scores advanced to Round 2: Letter of Intent (LOI) Submission. These teams were given a clinically focused research question with
